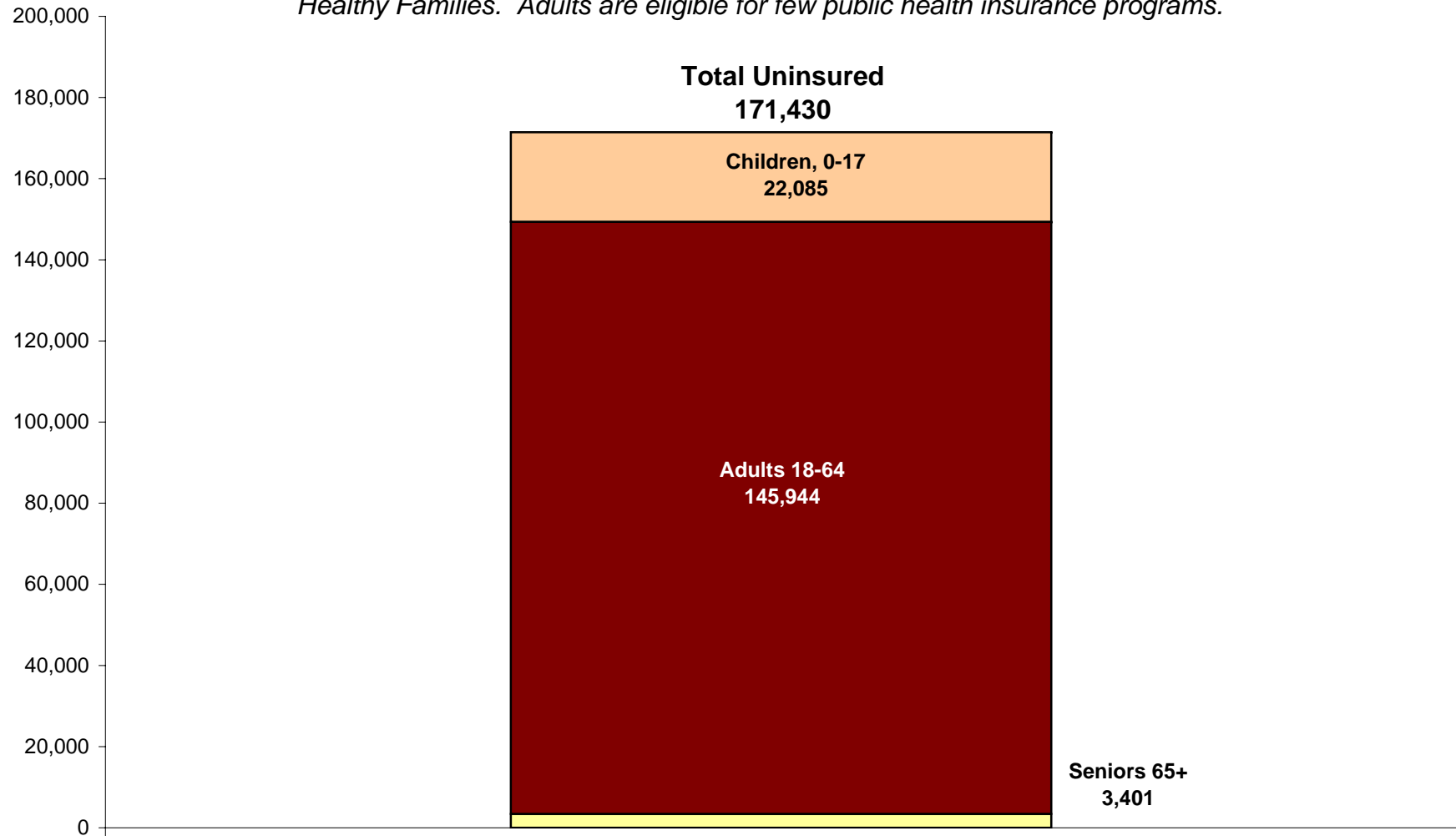


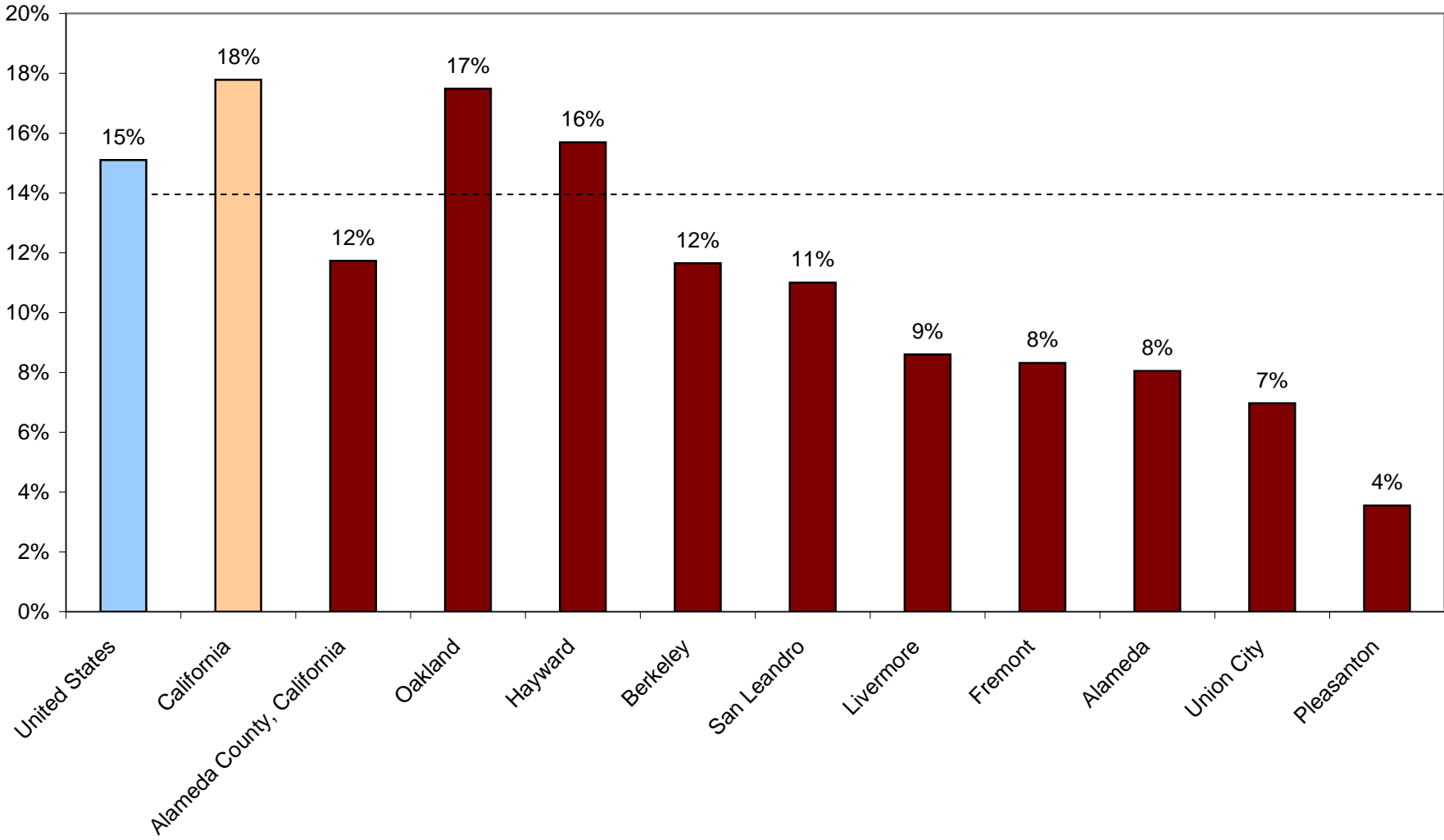
The Majority of Uninsured Alameda County Residents are Adults

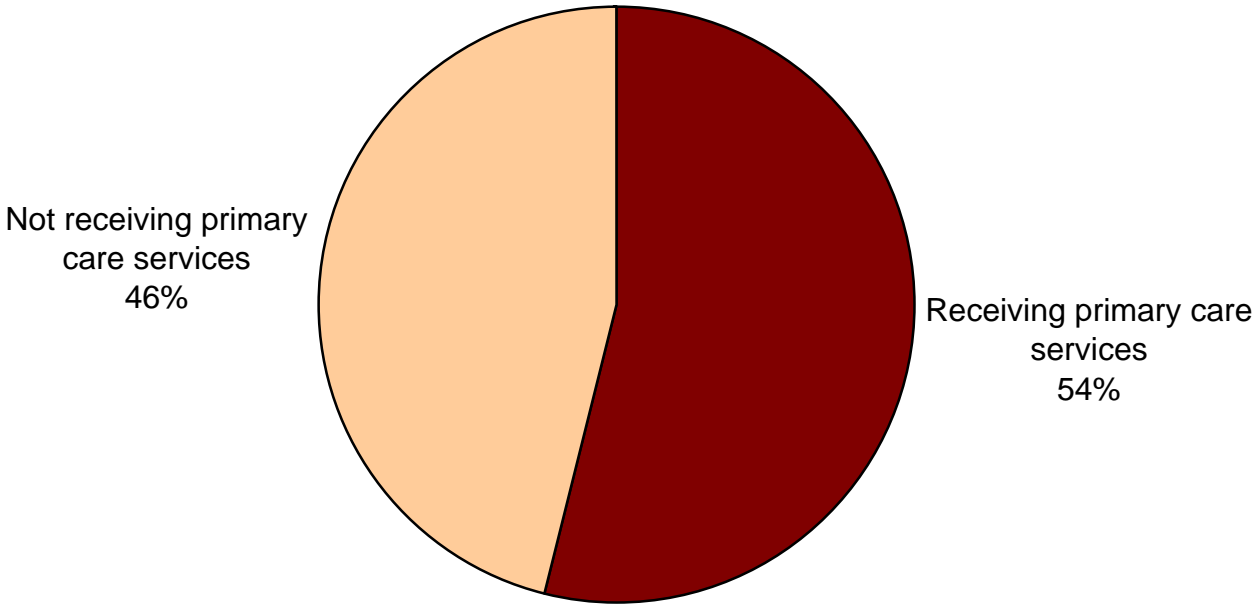
Oakland and Hayward are Above the National Average on the Percent of Residents who are Uninsured

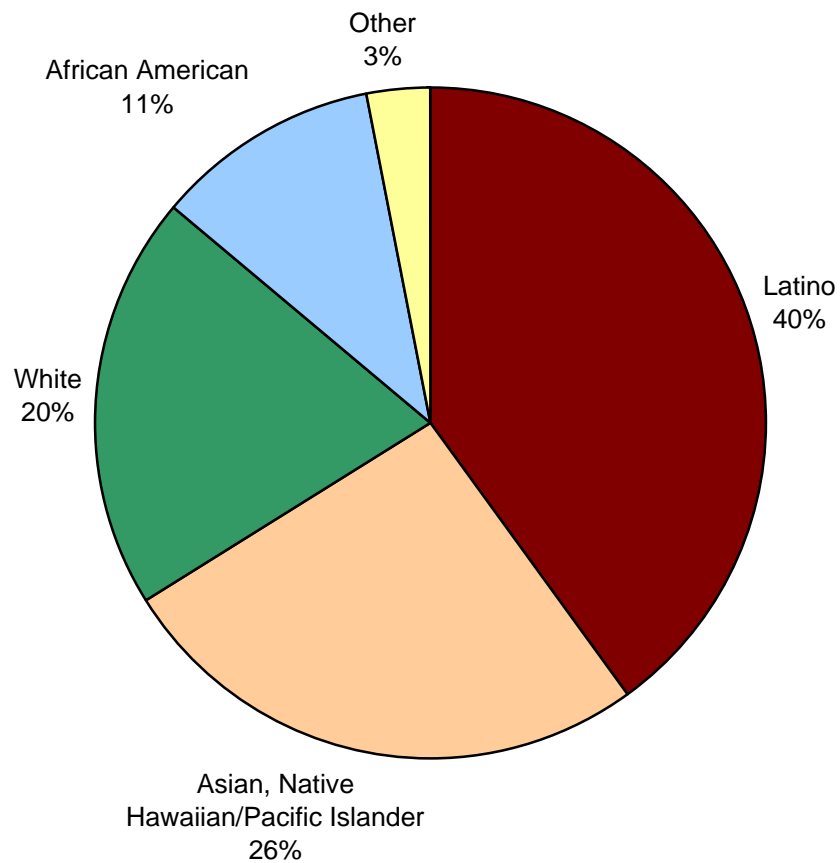
Over half of the uninsured in Alameda County are receiving primary care services

The uninsured can receive comprehensive primary care services at one of the eight community health centers or one of the four county clinics in Alameda County



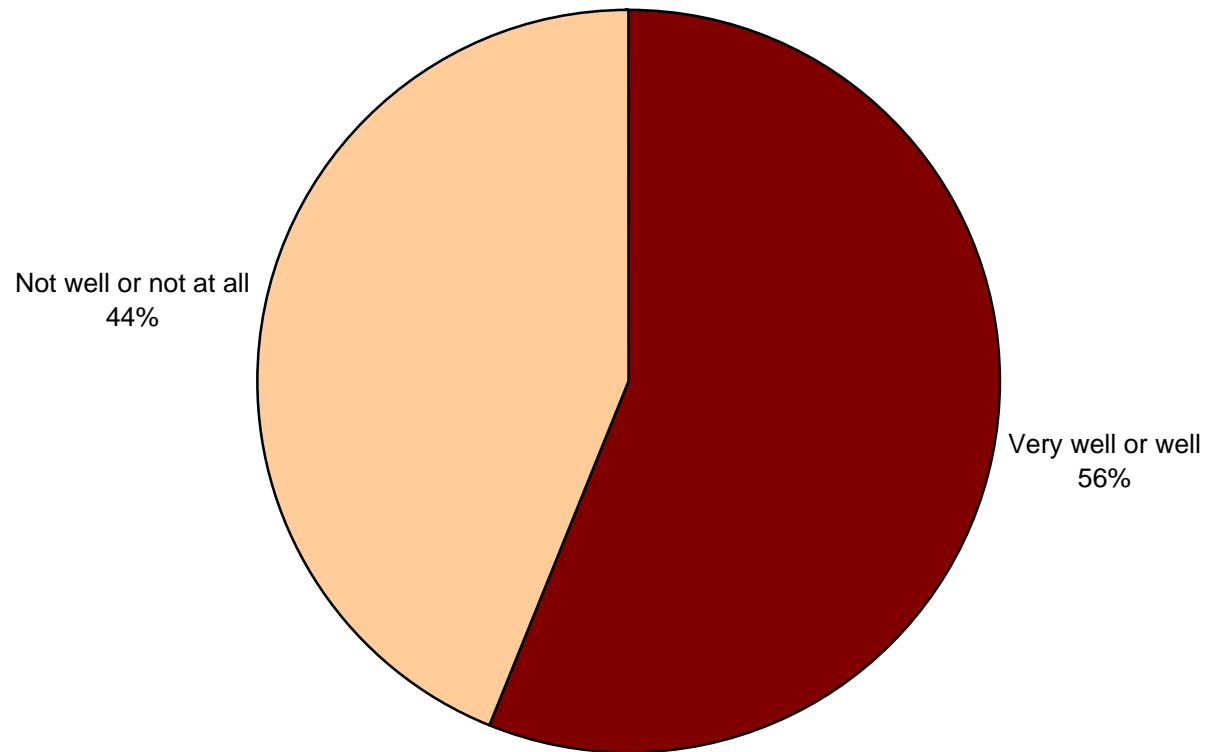

Forty Percent of the Uninsured in Alameda County are Latino and over twenty percent are either Asian or White



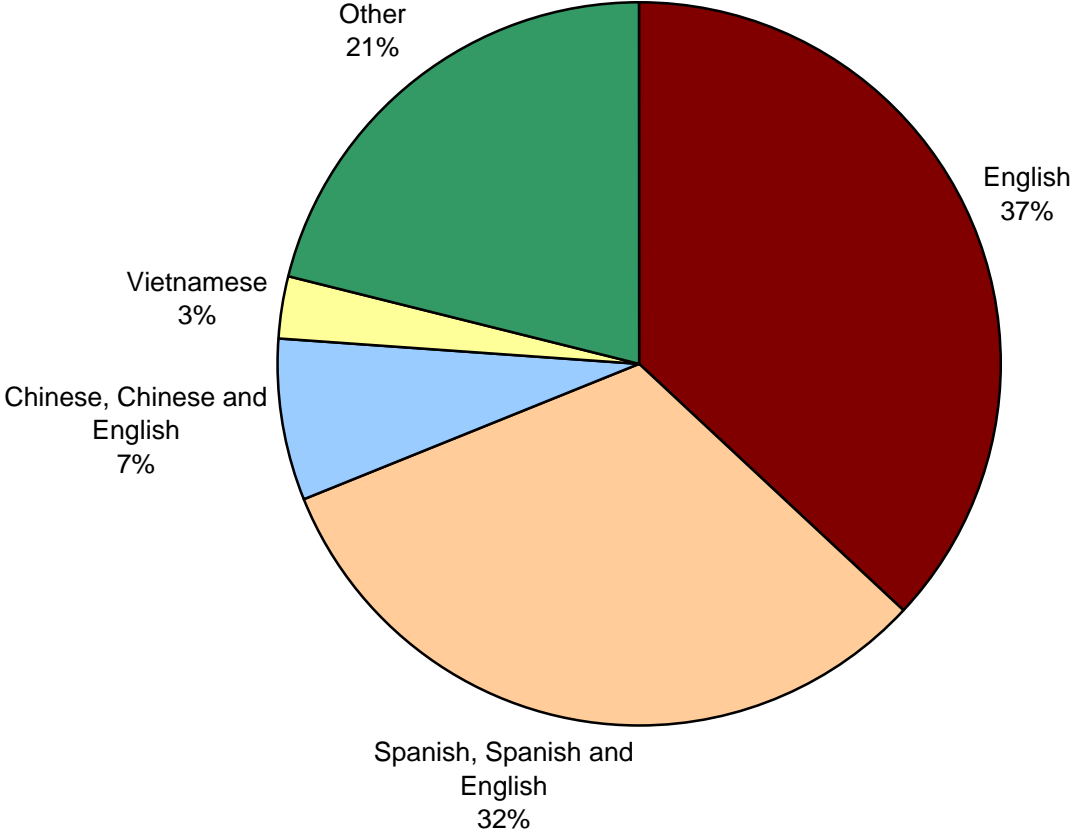

Nearly Half of the Uninsured in Alameda County are Limited-English Proficient



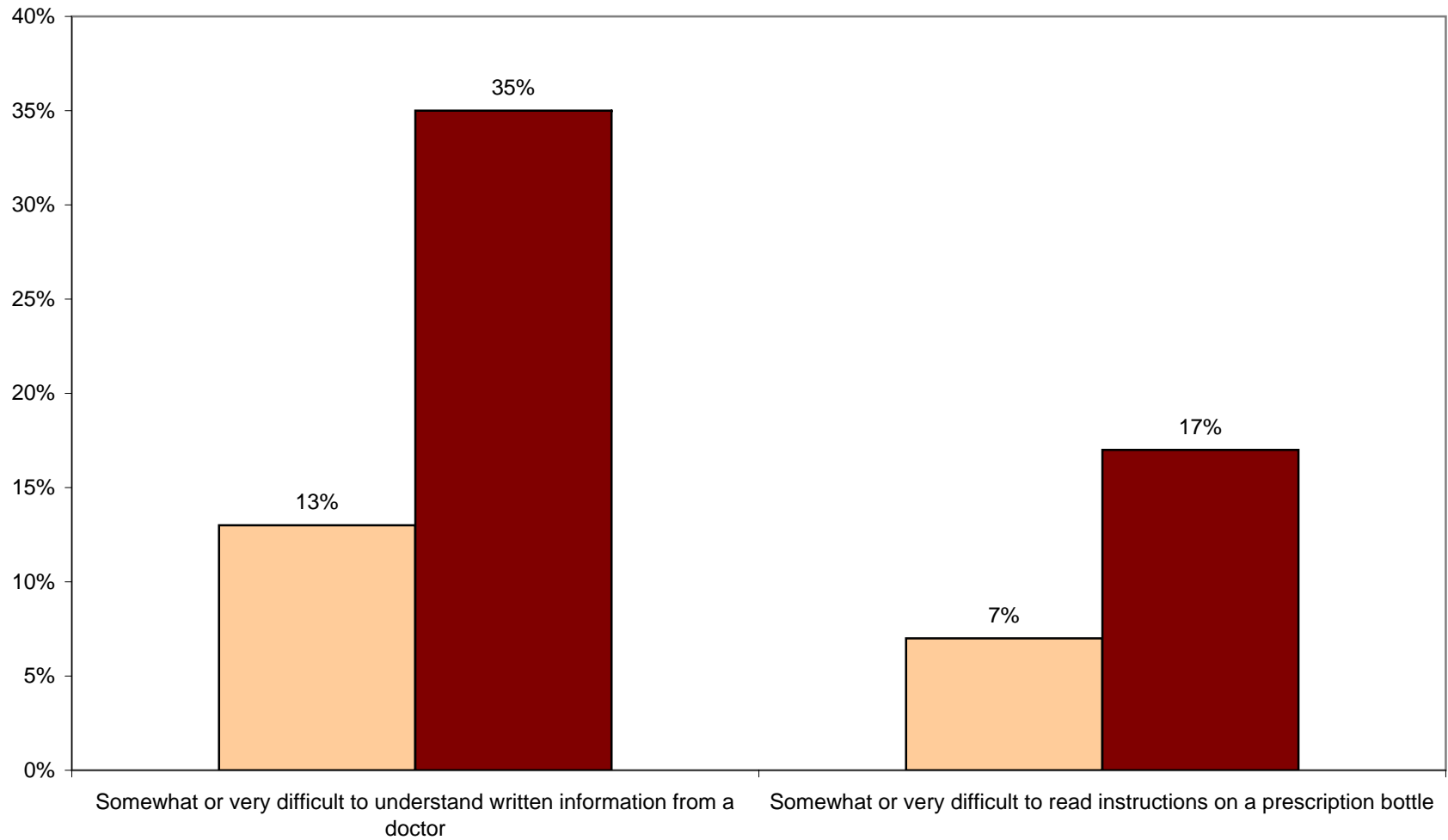

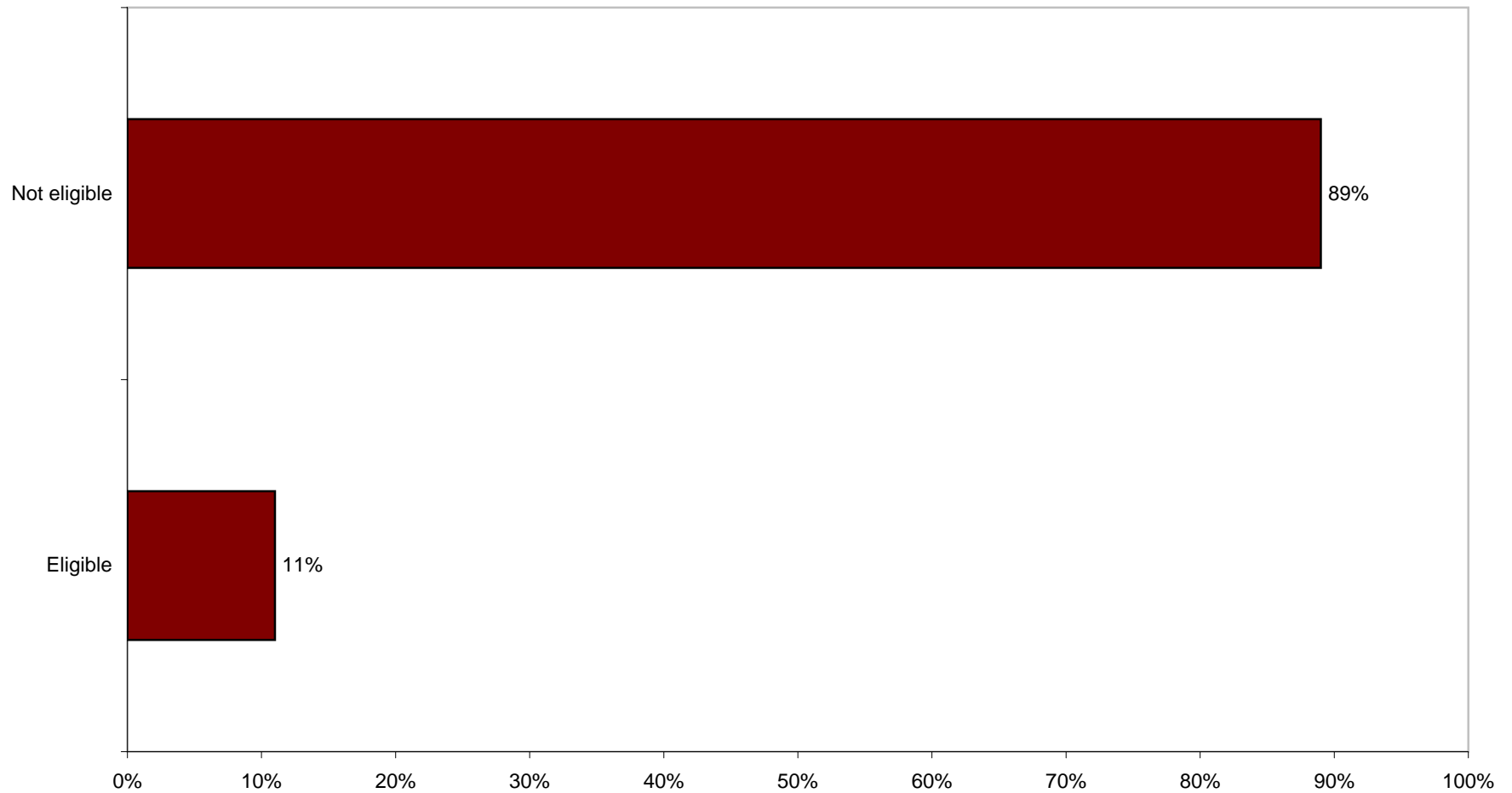
Uninsured residents in Alameda County face more language barriers than the insured population in accessing health services

The vast majority of uninsured Alameda County residents do not qualify for Medi-Cal or Healthy Families

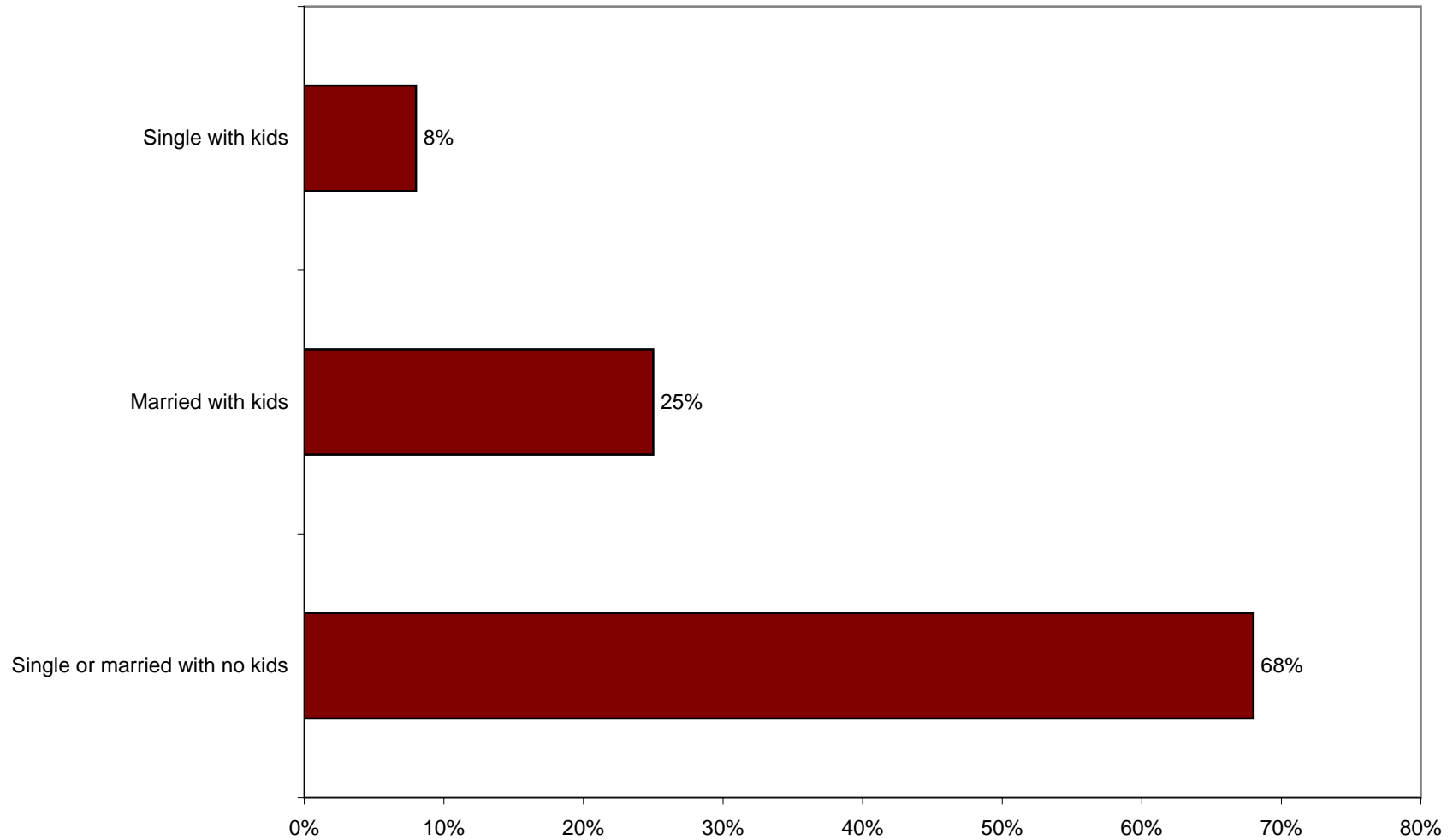
Many of the uninsured are not qualify for because of program requirements, such as family composition, income, disability status, and immigration documentation

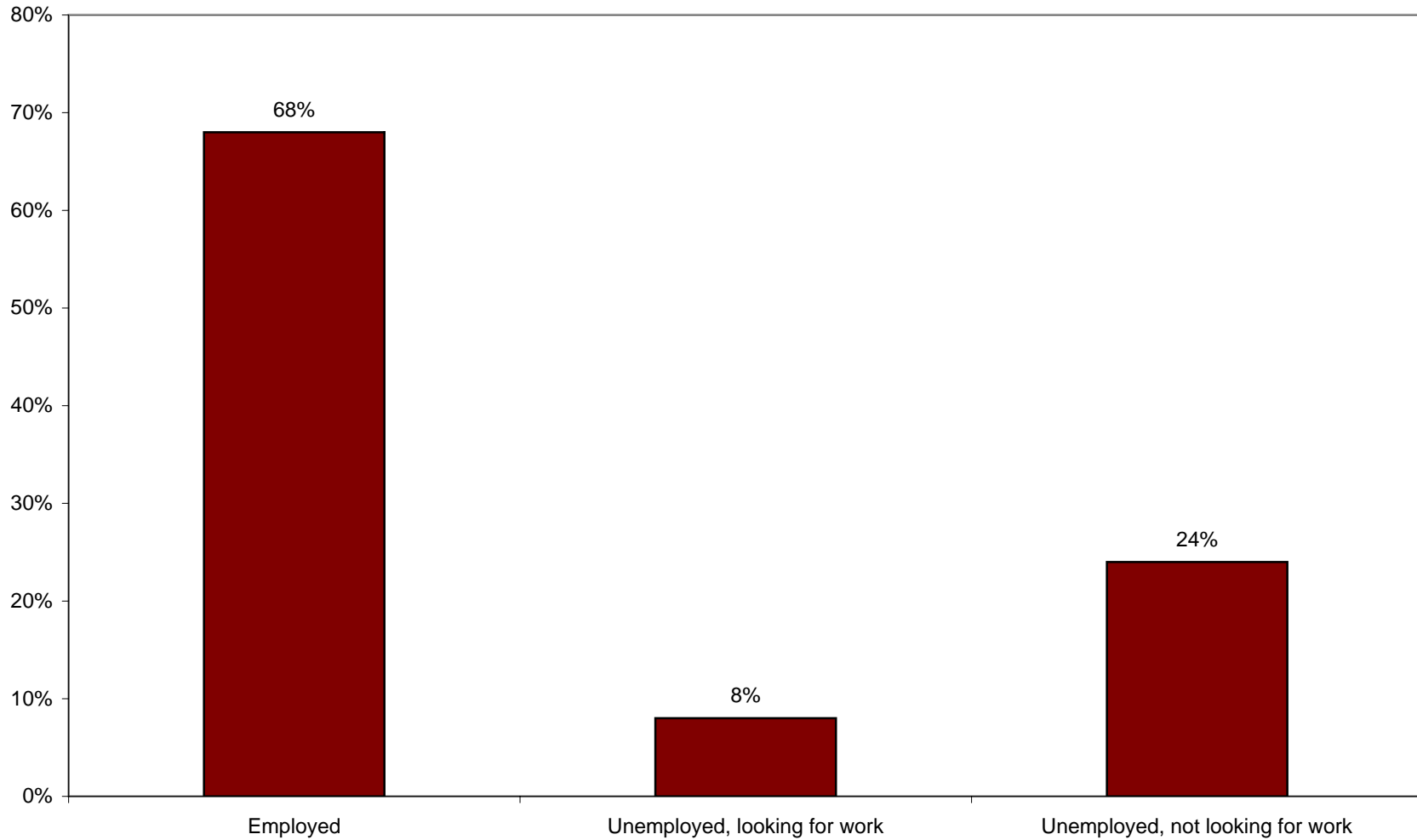
The majority of the Uninsured in Alameda County do not have children

The Vast Majority of Uninsured Residents in Alameda County are Employed

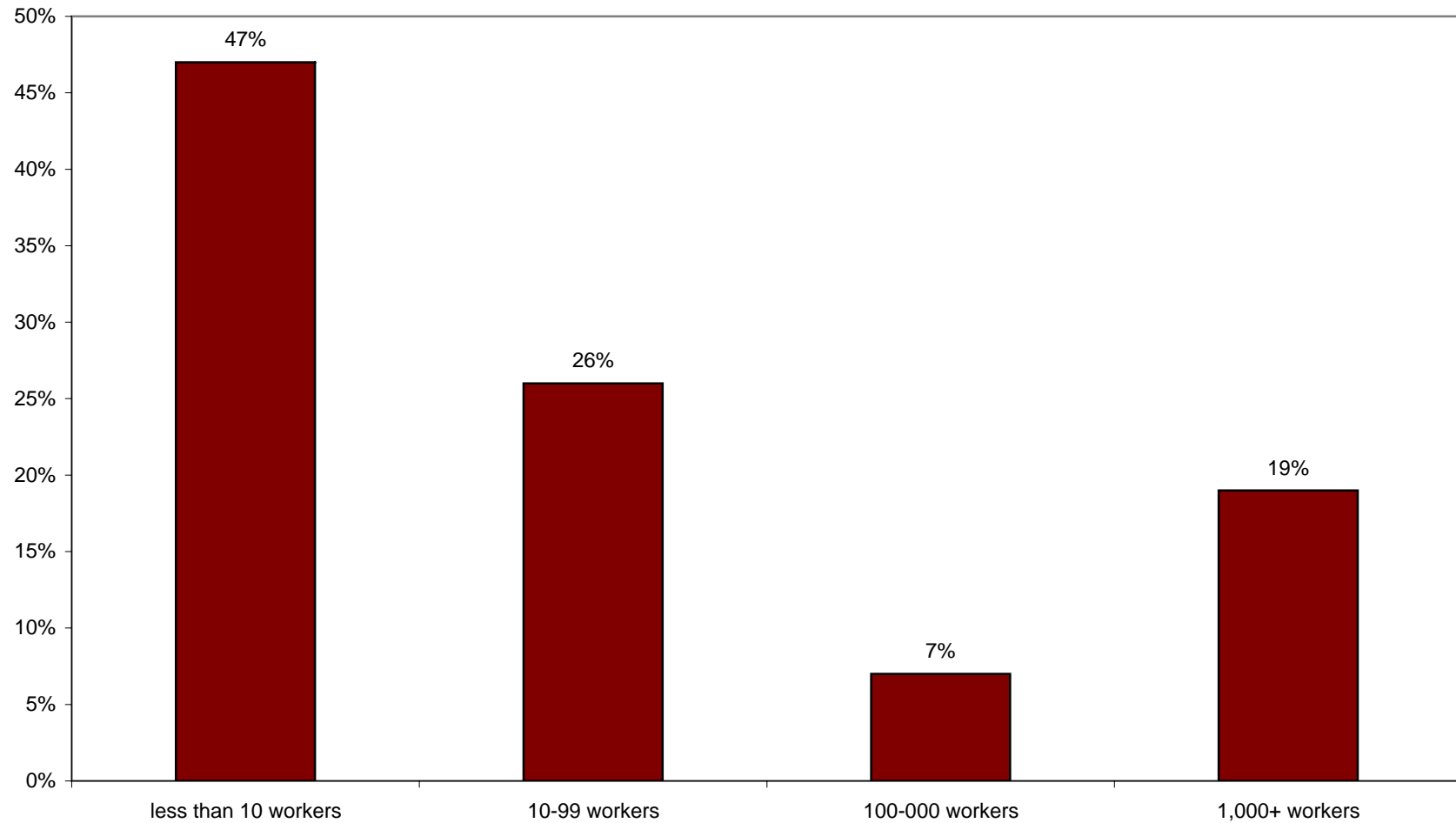
Those uninsured who are unemployed and not looking for work, likely fall into this category because they are students, retired, have family responsibilities, or have disabilities.

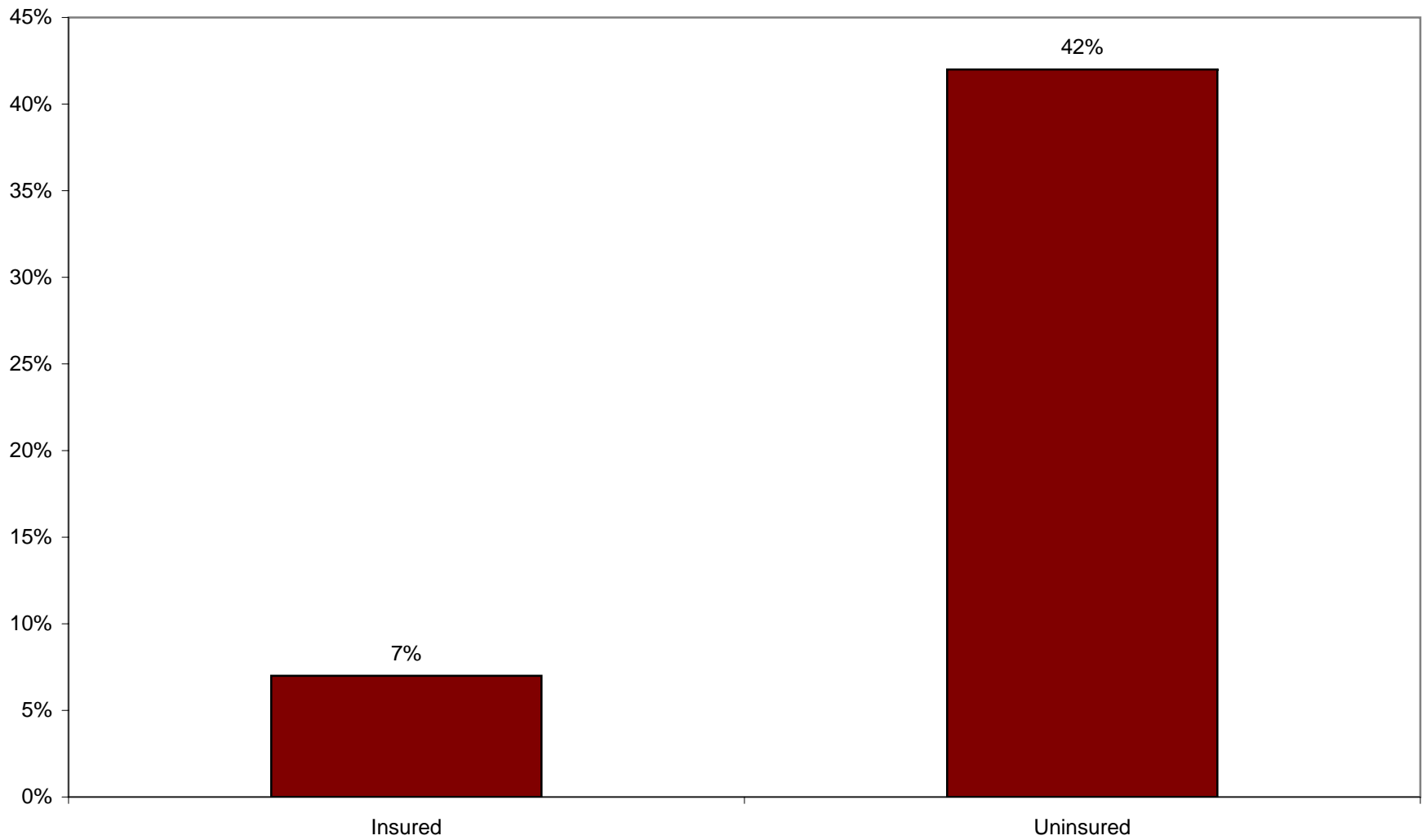
The majority of working uninsured are employed at small businesses

Typically small businesses are less likely to offer health insurance to employees, or if health coverage is offered, the employee's share of cost is unaffordable.



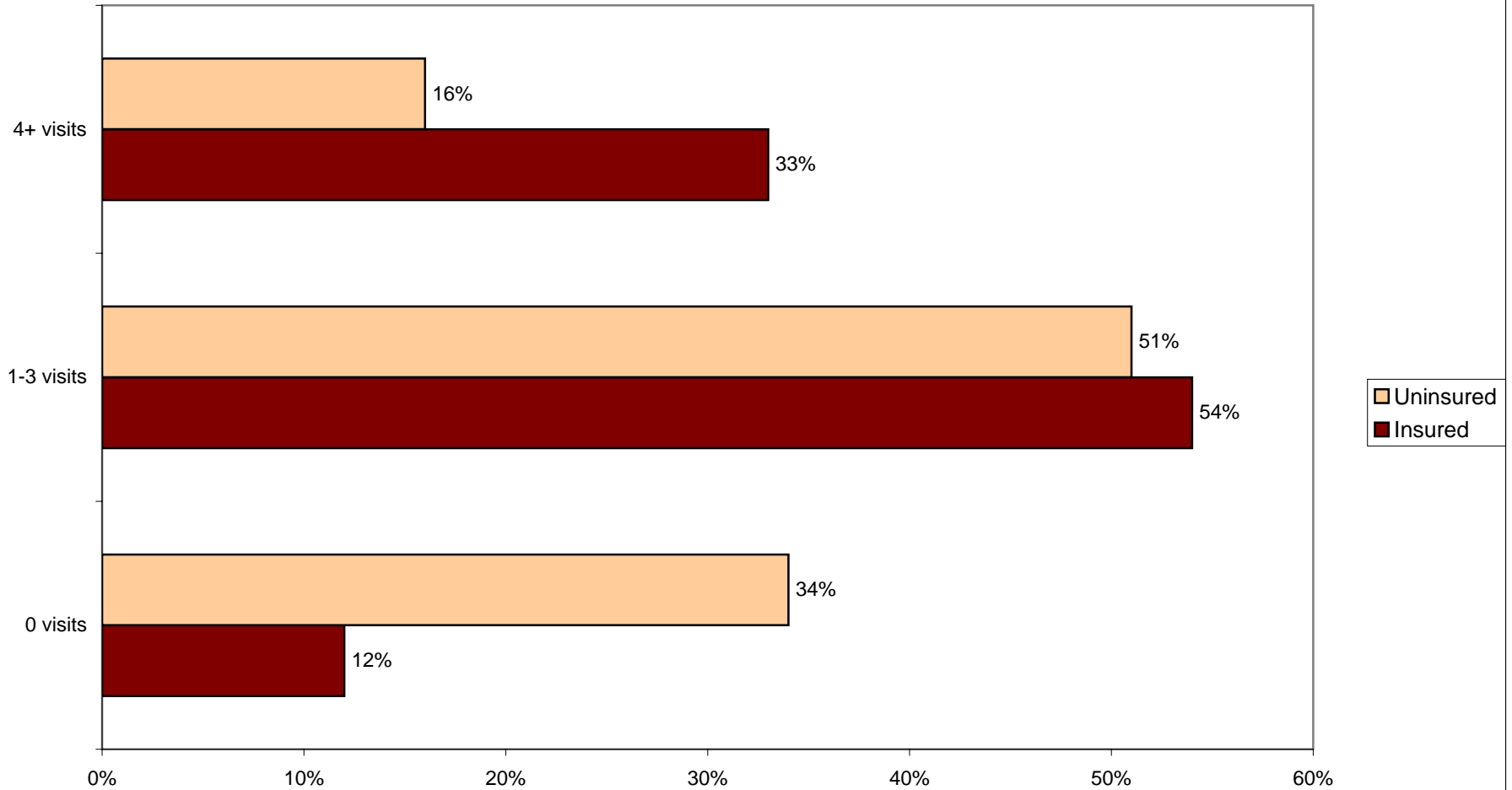

Uninsured Alameda County residents are less likely to have a usual source of care



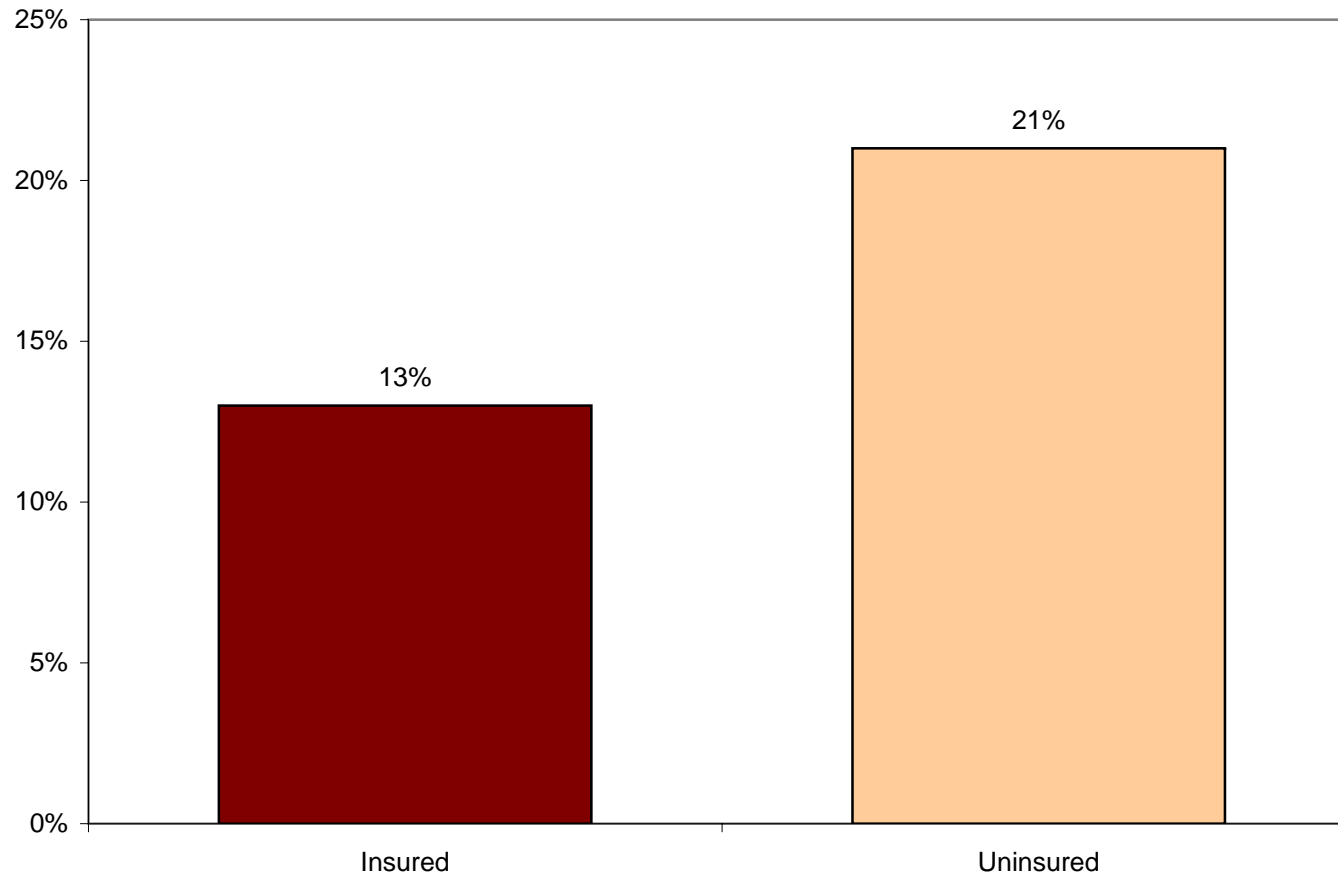

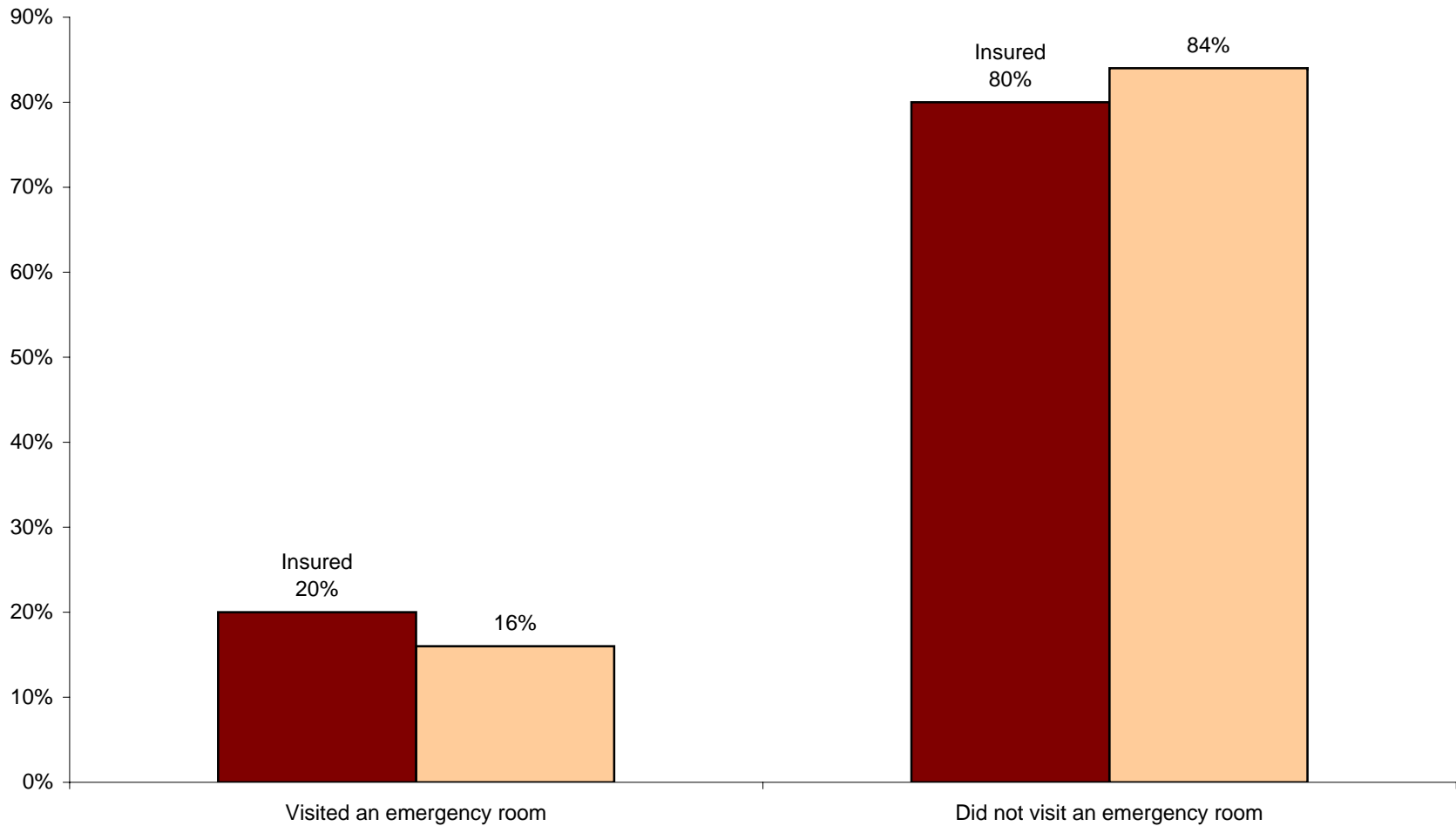
Uninsured Alameda County residents are more likely than the insured to delay getting care

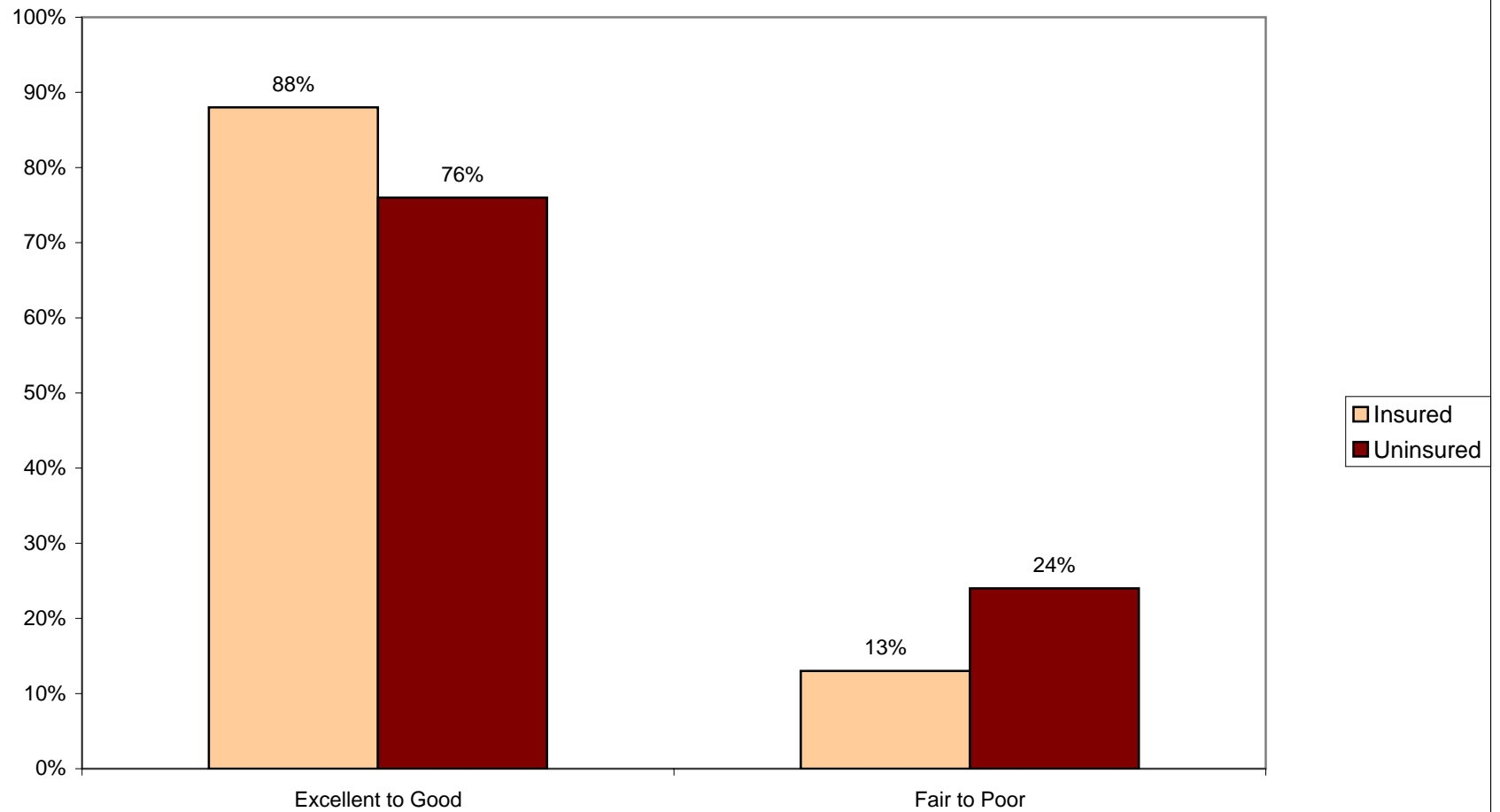
Uninsured Alameda County residents are less likely to use the Emergency Room than the Insured Population
